

Our Impact at a Glance

In the Fiscal Year 2023, the Food Bank of Northeast Louisiana made strides and increased access to nutritious foods to our neighbors experiencing food insecurity.

The Food Bank expanded its Mobile Distribution Program and now hosts distributions each month in four parishes to help serve our food insecure neighbors.

The Food Bank also grew its partnerships with local farmers through the Local Food Purchase Program to increase access to fresh produce to our neighbors in rural communities.

As a result of generous community support, the Food Bank provided about 6 million meals to our neighbors needing food assistance in a 12-parish service region, including 1,096,215 pounds of fresh produce.


Tina first visited a local Food Bank food pantry four years ago when she needed help feeding her family. She had stopped working in order to take care of her mother who was battling cancer.

But work often slows down each year during the winter months, which is when Tina turns to the Food Bank for help.


"The food helps me in a time of need when I don't have the money to make ends meet," she explained.

Tina uses the groceries she receives to help make meals for her family, which often includes Hayden's favorite, mac & cheese.




Financial Summary
