FY24 Impact

With the incredible support of thousands of individuals, businesses, churches and other organizations, the Food Bank of Northeast Louisiana provided over 6.9 million meals for our neighbors experiencing hunger in FY24.

To combat senior hunger in our community, the Food Bank expanded our programs to include the Federal Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP), allowing us to serve an additional 4,000 low-income seniors in Northeast Louisiana.

The Food Bank continued to ramp up delivery service to our Community Partners and distribution sites, transporting almost 4 million pounds of food across our 12-parish service region.

Thanks to the new partnerships of Brookshire's and Super One stores, and increased donations from Walmart and Sam's Club, the Food Bank's Retail Rescue Program has grown to provide the food equivalent of over 730,000 meals annually to our neighbors across Northeast Louisiana.

Sissy is a mother of three children and works fulltime as a housekeeper at a local hotel. Sometimes when finances get tight, she will visit a Food Bank food pantry in Lincoln Parish, where she receives a variety of groceries such as shelf-stable foods, fresh produce and proteins.

"The food helps out a lot...it helps me save to make ends meet," Sissy told us.

Jerry

Jerry lives on a fixed income and must pick and choose what he buys at the grocery store to save money for his medical expenses. He began visiting a Food Bank food pantry in Jackson Parish when food prices drastically increased.


"We have been able to get things at the pantry that we haven't been able to afford," Jerry said.




